Ritualist set ablaze in Nasarawa

A suspected ritualist was set ablaze by a mob while illegedly attempting to kidnap i six-year old boy for rituals in lasarawa, a surbub of Kaduna.

Eyewitness account claimed hat the man was caught by ome youths in the area while ttempting to kidnap one Munir haibu at Fulani Road off Market load Nasarawa.

The youths were said to have mmediately apprehended the uspect and gave him a thorough eating before setting him blaze.

All efforts to rescue him by lder people in the vicinity was aid to have been resisted by the be youths who were reported be armed with dangerous reapons.

The suspect's leg was said to ave been amputated by the ngry youths before he was ragged to a nearby bus stop nd set on fire. His charred body as left by the road side.

"A passer-by innocuously

peeped into an uncompleted building after seeing some unusual signs, only to stumble on a man attempting to kidnap a baby, the man on sensing danger took to his heels but luck ran out of him as a mob of youth pursued and caught up with him," eyewitness said adding that when people returned to the uncompleted building, the small boy was writhing in agony in a pool of his blood with his private part removed and eyes gouged

out by the kidnapper.

The boy was said to have been rushed to Saint Gerald Hospital where urgent medical attention was given to him.

Munir's mother Husseina Khalid said her son had been missing since February 18, 2007 and nobody was able to say his whereabouts until he was discovered lying in a pool of blood at the uncompleted building.

"His stomach was cut with his

intestine torn open, while his eyes were battered. I am not sure whether he will survive, let alone to live a normal human life now," she told newsmen in tears.

Reacting to the incident, the Kaduna state Police Command said it had raided the Nasarawa area and apprehended many youths suspected to have set the kidnapper ablaze.

Ten suspects according to the police sources were being interrogated.

UBEC threatens private schools

THE Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC) has directed state universal basic education boards across the country to close down private secondary schools that refuse to recognize the on-going disarticulation exercise.

Executive Secretary of the Commission, Professor Gidado Tahir gave the directive while inspecting some projects embarked upon by the Benue State Universal Basic Education Board (SUBEB).

Tahir who was visibly worried when he learnt that some grant-aided schools owned by individuals and voluntary agencies were not willing to accept the disarticulation of their schools for the disclosed programme, said the National Council on Education had approved that such unwilling schools be closed down.

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In his words: "Disarticulation is paramount, the UBE programme cannot succeed without it. The chairman of the board and his team have the responsibility to

stamp their feet on this issue. Any school that resists disarticlation should be punished".

He maintained that it was unfortunate for owners of private schools to think that the UBE programme was designed only for public schools, emphasizing that it was all encompassing.

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Tahir commended the State's Universal Primary Education Board (SUBEB) for embarking on relevant projects, maintaining that more efforts would give Benue high rating.
