Bloody poll: 11 killed in Akwa Ibom election violence

ABOUT 11 persons including a returning officer were feared dead while several others sustained serious injuries at the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) primaries held in Akwa Ibom State last Tuesday.

The exercise was to select councillorship candidates for the local government poll billed for June this year.

Although the identities of the victims have not been ascertained but Daily Champion gathered that

the returning officer was beheaded in Abak by suspected thugs who seized result from him. The exercise which kicked off amidst crisis last Monday could not hold in many parts of the state following alleged intrigues by some PDP chieftains to install their candidates.

It was speculated that the state governor, Chief Godswill Akpabio had reached consensus with PDP stakeholders in the state to ensure that his cohorts took over all wards and councils to make way for his return to power in 2011.

Also the speaker of the state House of Assembly, Obong Ignatius Kevin Edet representing Ibiono Ibom constituency is also holding sway in the area to actualize his senate aspiration in the

same year.

The purported stakeholders meeting held at closed doors yesterday at the Government House and presided over by the governor was aimed at attaining a possibility of reducing tension in the exercise as well as
