10-YEAR-OLD BOY CRUSHED TO DEATH AT DEI-DEI

A 10-year-old boy was crushed to death Sunday morning by a vehicle along Kubwa-Zuba Expressway

A witness said the deceased, son of a police officer living at the Mobile Police barracks Dei-dei, was crossing the ever-busy expressway from the barracks when the driver of the car, coming from the Kubwa axis, knocked him down.

The witness, who blamed the deceased for not using the pedestrian bridge, said he was indecisive when he got to the centre of the road, which made the driver hit him.

He said the boy died on the spot while his corpse was immediately taken to the Kubwa General hospital.

Similarly, four persons were injured in an accident which occurred around 10pm same day along Zuba road.

A witness said the victims, two pregnant women, a man and a 2-year-old baby were inside a commercial bus when another bus coming directly behind them, lost control and hit their bus.

The witness said they were taken to the Kubwa General Hospital for medical attention.

When contacted, the head, Accident and Emergency Unit of the hospital, Paul Olise, confirmed both accidents, but said the corpse of the police officer's son had already been deposited at the hospital's morgue.

He said three of the victims in the bus had already been discharged, while the remaining one is responding to treatment.
