'How murder suspect's wife attempted to hide cars in her father's house'

The Ogun State Police Command has disclosed how the wife of a murder suspect attempted to hide some exotic vehicles, which the police needed for their investigation, in the house of her father, a retired police officer. The command didn't say how many cars were recovered.

The woman, simply known as Mama Vicky, has since been arrested.

The police have been investigating Mama Vicky's husband, Tunde Olatunbosun, 49, for the alleged killing, on April 29, 2017, of one Rasaq, a motor-boy at a car wash centre at Leme, Abeokuta, the Ogun

State capital.

Olatunbosun, City News gathered, shot Rasaq dead over an argument on the removal of a truck at the centre. The state Commissioner of Police,

Ahmed Illiyasu, who paraded the murder suspect, among others, last Monday, said that Olatunbosun, after committing the crime, fled to Togo. The police were, however, able to track him through what the police chief called technology intelligence and brought him back to Ogun State last week Thursday.

Olatunbosun, before he was said to have fled to Togo, was understood to have driven to his residence in the Kotopo area, along the Abeokuta/Ibadan road, to brief his wife of the incident. Police sources said neighbours of the Olatunbosuns squealed they sighted the woman on that fateful day directing the

movement of the expensive vehicles out of their residence.

Interrogation of her by the Federal Special Anti-Robbery Squad (FSARS), thereafter, revealed that she had taken the cars to the house of her father, a retired police officer, to hide them away from police enquiry. Illiyasu then ordered that the vehicles be taken to the FSARS office at Obada Oko in Abeokuta, while Mama Vicky was further being questioned.

The police command spokesman, Abimbola Oyeyemi, said the police were still investigating the Olatunbosuns' reason for taking the vehicles to another location.
