Flooding kills 300, displaces 100,000 in 29 states, FCT in 9 months — NEMA

the bank of rivers Niger and Benue also affected about 500,000 persons with over 100,000 of them displaced.

The Director General of the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA), Alhaji Mustapha Habib Ahmed, disclosed this at an emergency technical meeting on flood in Abuja.

He said with the release of excess water by the operators of Lagdo Dam in the Republic of Cameroun, which started on September 13, more communities along the coastal areas would be affected.

He explained that the released water from Lagbo Dam would cascade down to Nigeria through River Benue and its tributaries thereby inundating communities that had already been impacted by heavy rainfall.

"The released water will complicate the situation further downstream as Nigeria's inland reservoirs including Kainji, Jebba, and Shiroro are also expected to overflow between now and October ending according Nigeria Hydrological Services Agency (NIHSA).

"According to NIHSA, Kainji and Jebba dams have already started spilling excess water from their reservoirs. This will have consequences serious on frontline states and communities along the courses of rivers Niger and

"The situation requires urgent attention of all stakeholders to match this early warning with early action."

NEMA governments frontline states to move away communities at risk inundation, identify safe higher grounds for evacuation of persons and make adequate stockpiles of food and non-food items, potable water, hygiene, safety and security to enable them a fair level of comfort during periods of possible displacement.

The flood which affected LGAs: Lavun, Magama, Rafi, towns and villages along Kontroom Chales Media Kontagora, Gbako, Mokwa,

Lapai, Katcha, Agaie Suleja, Shiroro, Mashegu, Agwara, Bida, Edati, Munya, Bosso, Chanchaga, Paikoro and Wushishi located at up and downstream of the four hydroelectric dams had been hit by the flood where houses, farmlands, bridges and linked roads were washed away and the socioeconomic activities of the communities affected.

"People living in riverine areas should relocate to safer grounds already identified. NiMeT's latest prediction indicated that the end of the rainy season will be accompanied by violent windstorms as such people avoid should standing

under trees during rainfall and also avoid substandard structures," Inga said.

Also, the Nasarawa State House of Assembly on Monday urged the state government as a matter of urgency to provide relief materials to victims of floods across the state.

Speaker

Balarabe-Abdullahi made the call while reading the House resolution after the majority leader, Tunga, raised the issue under matters of public importance during plenary in Lafia, the state capital.

He urged the state government to "relocate communities affected by flood to safer places for their comfortability and to improve on their standard of living,
