The driver, who was said to be carrying bags of tomatoes and pepper, was allegedly requested by the Police to "settle" them. It

His insistence that

would not pay more the N20, according to sour allegedly infuriated the policemen, one of whom was said to have fired his gun at the bus. The bullet hit

the driver at the back of his

neck, killing him instantly.

The policemen allegedly abandoned their duty post and fled into town to escape the anger of a mob that had immediately gathered at the scene of the incident.

When the news of the killing got to the Ilale Unit of the National Union of Road Transport Workers (NURTW), the drivers were said to have sent a team to the scene to confirm the incident, after which they took to the streets in protest.

By last night, two Police posts at Ita-Oba and Idasen in Owo metropolis had been razed to the ground while a detachment of armed mobile policemen had arrived to reinforce security at the bigger Divisional Police Headquarters at Ijebu-Owo.

Eyewitness accounts indicated that many policemen resident in the town had fled the city to escape the anger of the drivers, who claimed that the incident was not the first in the town.

Police outlesting bytes

Police authorities have, however, appealed for calm with a pledge to punish the trigger-happy cop, who they said had been arrested and was undergoing interrogations.

Senior Police officers who visited the town expressed regrets over the incident.
