Militants Seize Two Italians, Kill Soldier

• Colleagues Retaliate, Raze Community

VI O L E N C E remained on the upbeat in Rivers State on Thursday as militants and soldiers unleashed terror on innocent citizens.

The first victims of the

The first victims of the crisis were two Italian oil workers of Saipem, who were kidnapped by suspected militants at a relaxation centre in Rumuolumeni in Obio-Akpor Local Council of the state. The militants were said to have killed a soldier and injured another both of who were in the area.

In anger, the other soldiers guarding the facility at Aker base, stormed a nearby settlement and razed its structures.

Dickson, described as the leader of a syndicate that abducted a Japanese working with Homan Engineering Company in Harcourt.

In the Rumuolumeni incident, The Guardian learnt, some persons were injured when the soldiers struck but there

was no causality.

Meanwhile, one of the militant groups, the Movement of the Niger People (MONDP), which last released German hostage, has resolved to cease all hostile action and urged the Federal Government to reconsider the option of military offensive as a solu-

tion to the crisis.

A source told The Guardian yesterday that the suspected militants dressed in army camouflage invaded the slum on Thursday night and proceeded to the place where the two expatriates were drinking in a bar.

As they attempted to abduct the Italians, the said. unarmed solider, who had assumed that the kidnappers were members of the Joint Task Force on patrol confronted them and was head. shot on the Another solider, who attempted to escape from the scene, was also shot at by the armed fighters.

Amid the pandemonium that ensued, some militants · the ` absconded with the two oil workers while others engaged the soldiers guarding the Italian oil firm in gun battle. According to the Public Relations Officer of the Amphibious Brigade, Major Musa Sagir, who confirmed the killing of the solider vesterday, the shooting attracted soldiers stationed at Saipem base, and a cross-fire between them and the kidnap-

pers ensued.

"They were dressed in army camouflage and our men had mistaken them for soldiers but when the men realised they were kidnappers they engaged them in fierce fighting," Sagir said. "I can confirm that one of our men was shot died while another was injured. Heavy damage was also inflicted on the kidnappers. Our men injured about four of them and they lost four rifles, which were recovered.

Sagir further said that the injured militants

and their cohorts retreated to a nearby ietty where they had a waiting speedboat in which they escaped with the Italians.

As soon as the militants left, the infuriated soldiers proceeded to a nearby slum at Aker base and razed the place. Witnesses alleged that the soldiers bullied the residents, forcing most of them to flee that night.

When The Guardian visited the area vesterday, those whose property were not destroyed were seen parking their belongings for fear of another attack by the

military. The rash of kidnappings in Rivers State since June led to a twoday military offensive in parts of Port Harcourt last week and the militarisation of most of the oil companies in the The state. spokesman said if the oil companies were left without the soldiers, the militants would wreak havoc on their facilities:

In a 10-point state¹ ment made available to The Guardian, MONDP spokesman urged the government to immediately re-consider the option of "force for force" as its only response to the crisis in the Niger Delta.
