## Nine die in pipeline fire, collapsed building

TWO disasters in Lagos and Ogun States have claimed nine persons. Five people died in the Ogun State caused by a pipeline explosion while a collapsed building in Lagos killed four residents.

Only two weeks ago, a pipeline fire in Ijegun area of Alimosho Local Council of Lagos led to the death of several people while property worth millions of naira

was destroyed.

A trapped victim in the collapsed building, who earlier called his relations on his mobile phone was no longer responding to inquiries about his condition yesterday.

The fire outbreak, which started yesterday morning, was allegedly caused by vandals who damaged the Mosimi-Ibadan pipeline axis of the Nigerian

Corporation (NNPC). Nine people were reported to have sustained various degrees of injury from the incident.

Among the casualties were members of the Petroleum Tanker Drivers (PTD) and mobile policemen on duty at the facility.
