THE Tombia Council ▲ of Chiefs in Rivers State have petitioned the Presidency and the National Assembly, requesting for investigation into alleged destruction of their

seven villages and killing of over 30 persons by the Joint Military Task Force (JTF) last Saturday.

And in furtherance of its declared oil war said to have been occasioned by the JTF's attacks on Tombia communities, the Movement for the Emancipation of the

Niger Delta (MEND) has again used high explosives to destroy another major pipeline belonging to Shell Petroleum Development Company (SPDC) at the Elem-Kalabari Cawthorne Channel axis

in the state. Already hundreds of Tombia residents have fled the community, following speculation that the JTF was planning further attacks in the

area. The attack on seven Tombia communities. namely Elem-Tombia, Ogboma, Elem-Bekinkiri, Oloko, IyallaAma, Alapuminjibiri and Mbiakafimimo last Saturday by the JTF triggered off the recent spate of attacks on oil
