## Gunmen kill policemen, driver, abduct headmistress

CUNMEN suspected to be kidnappers yesterday struck again in Eket, Akwa Ibom State, taking away the Headmistress of Mobil Pegasus Nursery/Primary School, Mrs. Lakshmi Itauma.

The incident, which occurred while Itauma was going to work, claimed the lives of the driver to the vehicle and two policemen attached to her.

Itauma was reportedly on her way to QIT, the operational base of Mobil at Ibeno when the gunmen intercepted her car.

Eyewitnesses said the gunmen, numbering about 15, waylaid the headmistress' car along Grace Bill Road in Eket, shot her official driver and a police escort killing both of them instantly. Another policeman who attempted to confront the hoodlums was also killed before they escaped through Onna-lkot Abasi Highway.

The bullet-ridden car of the Mobil staff school head

teacher and the remains of her driver as well as the policeescort were later found lying on the road.

The eyewitnesses added that the hoodlum struck at about 7 a.m. while workers and school children were going to their workplaces and schools.

They told *The Guardian* that passersby and residents of the area, on hearing the sporadic gunshots along Grace Bill Road, ran for their dear lives.

In the last one week, more that four people have been kidnapped, including the wife of a former military governor, Group Captain Sam Enwang.

None of the victims has been released till date, as sources close to their families said the kidnappers' ransom demands were "on the high side."

Confirming yesterday's incident, Akwa Ibom State Commissioner of Police, Walter Rugbere, said efforts were being made to track down the hoodlums behind

He called on residents of the state not to panic, assuring that the police were handling the situation very well. However, Rugbere charged the state's residents to report any suspected criminal to the police for appropriate investigation.

Meanwhile, a whopping ransom of N70 million has been demanded by the kidnappers of one Dim Maxwell Obiajulua, Managing Director of Obi-Links Petrol Station for him to be set free, Delta State Police Public Relations Officer, Charles Muka, has disclosed.

Obiajulua was abducted from his home last week in

Asaba by a gang of kidnappers.

Muka said the kidnappers, who had been in contact with the victim's wife, had suddenly gone incommunicado because of fear that the police were closing in on them.

He also disclosed that in a renewed bid to rid the state of criminal elements, the Delta Police Command has arrested 74 suspected cultists in various part of the state.

Muka, who spoke in Asaba on

Tuesday, added that some of the suspects were arrested at Issele-Mkpitime, Aniocha-North Local Council, with 42 nabbed in the home of one Ofili Nkemwa, a businessman, in the course of trying to initiate them into a cult. Another 32 suspected cultists were picked up at Delta State University (DELSU), Abraka.

He said Nkemwa was still at large while the matter had been transferred to the state Criminal Investigation Department (CID) for further investigations.

The police spokesman assured that the suspects would soon appear in court, adding that their arrest was made possible through a tipoff from the affected communities.
