The federal government carried out its threat to flush out hostagetaking militants in the Niger Delta of the country using military action on Friday as Nigerian troops raided ariverside slum in the southern city

"The report reaching us in Port Harcourt is that the Army has invaded some villages and there are dead people everywhere," a source

was also quoted. A local radio, Rhythm FM, was quoted as saying "Troops have landed in (the district of) llabuch

and they are shooting sporadically, moving from house to house.

The agency said a military spokesman confirmed that an operation was under way but

declined to give details. Residents said the troops fanned out over a large riverside area along a road where kidnappers last Sunday dumped and burnt a getaway car after abducting six foreign oil workers from a nightclub popular with expatriates.
