shots forced traders to vacate the market for most part of the day. Traffic wardens and

other law enforcement agents deserted their duty posts as gun shots rent the air while motorists meandered to their destinations in the confusion that lasted for hours.

In Rumuolumeni, the fighting that started on Saturday continued as more and more people were killed and their corpses taken away by the assassins, apparently for ritual purposes. Police sources said no

fewer than seven people had murdered Rumuolumeni by Monday afternoon. Policemen were later deployed in most parts of Port Harcourt as Vice President, Goodluck Jonathan, and Niger Delta Governors arrived for a meeting on how to end hostage taking and bring about peace and development in the region.
