60 Illegal Bunkerers Roasted Alive In PH

•20 Die In Osun Auto Crash

No fewer than 60 persons engaged in illegal bunkering of petroleum products reportedly lost their lives in the Soku area of Rivers State on Wednesday in a fire incident.

Saturday Independent gathered that the inferno was ignited by sparks from two iron heads used as anchor of the boats used for the bunkering.

The fire was said to have spread to other boats that were also load-

ing fuel illegally.

Eyewitnesses said scores of others narrowly escaped unscathed just as an unspecified number of persons sustained various degrees of injuries. Those who escaped were said to have jumped into the river and swum to safety.

Sources said out of the 60 suspected to have died in the incident, six were from Andoni, while others were from riverine communities in Rivers, Bayelsa and neighbouring states in the Niger Delta.
