## 23 Killed As Transborder Bandits, Cults Invade Adamawa, C'River

## Three Killed In Calabar Cult War

Anarchy ruled in Ganye, headquarters of Ganye Local Government Area of Adamawa State, at the weekend when trans-border bandits invaded the popular Ganye International Cattle Market.

At the end of the operation, no fewer than 20 persons, including one policeman and scores of local

hunters were killed.

The daredevil robbers stormed the market Saturday afternoon and operated for several hours, leaving many persons dead while scores received gunshot injuries. An eyewitness told *Daily Inde-*

pendent in Ganye, a three-hour drive from Yola, that the bandits numbering over 20 stormed the market and shot sporadically and

Sunday. cident on command's spokesperson, Altine Daniel (ASP), stated that about 11 persons were killed on the spot, among them one police man and one robbery suspect. She disclosed that the mobile handset of the dead suspect was

found, adding that it will assist the police in tracking down the robbers. Meanwhile, Residents of Calabar, Cross River State capital, are

now gripped with fear following the upsurge of cult-related clashes that claimed at least three lives in the last one week Many law-abiding officers in the city are receiving treatment

for various injuries intlicted on them by the gangsters.

The most affected area is Calabar South Local Government Area, where youths within the ages of 16 to 30 attack themselves

at will with dangerous weapons including sophisticated guns.
The state Police Commissioner, Mr. Emmanuel Ezeozue, who issued a statement to con-

demn the cult war, said the po-lice have established that the warring gangs enjoy the support and protection of influential people in the state.
