Suspected Ritual Killers Dump Victim's Corpse At Refuse Heap In Ogun

In what appeared to be a case of ritual killing, the corpse of a 23 year-old lady was on Sunday discovered at the Olomoore refuse dump site along the Abeokuta – Lagos expressway at Abeokuta metropolis, the Ogun state capital.

The lady whose vital body parts had been severed, was identified as Sitira by a middle-aged woman, Esther Adewuyi, who said she is a relative of Sitira.

She said that the 23 year-old Sitira had been living with her mother in the Iberekodo area of Abeokuta North Local Government Area after the death of her only child almost two year ago.

According to her, Sitira, a hairdresser apprentice was last seen in their house around 10pm on Saturday and that they discussed what she intended to do on getting her 'freedom'. She said that nobody in the house, including her younger siblings in the family knew when she left home.

She further explained that Sitira, a hair dresser apprentice was last seen in their house around 10pm on Saturday where they both discussed plans for her freedom disclosing nobody, including her younger siblings in the family knew when she left home.

Our correspondent gathered that Sitira, who was

said to be a commercial sex worker in Abeokuta and another lady, whose was still missing at the time of filing this report were thrown off a moving jeep at the Olomoore refuse dump site, notorious for harbouring ritualists in the past.

When our correspondent visited the scene ladies' items including pants, brassieres, ladies' armless camisole, lip-sticks, powder kits, nail-paint as well as a pack of cotton wool, contents of the missing lady's bag littered the ground.

Closer examination of Sitira's corpse revealed that she had substantial flesh wound on her right arm oozing out fluid.

Meanwhile, efforts made by our correspondent to get the reaction of Ogun state Police Command Public Relations Officer, PPRO, Muyiwa Adejobi, a Deputy Superintendent of Police (DSP) on the matter, proved abortive as his mobile line was switched off at the time of filing this report.
