Puncturing LADOL's Indigenous Ownership Claim

The Managing Director of the Lagos Deep Offshore Logistic Base (LADOL), Dr. Amy Jadesimi, recently shocked her international audience with another falsehood in Madrid, Spain, when she claimed that "Eighty per cent of the 680 million new jobs the world needs will be created by Small and Medium Enterprises (SME's) and larger indigenous companies such as LADOL." According to a statement issued by her company, which was published in the media, Jadesimi, spoke at the 19th Edition of the International Economic Forum on Africa with the theme: "African Integration: Investing in our common future."

LADOL's claim to indigenous status has since
