Two killed in attempt on Atiku's aide's life

Assailants bolt away with body of their killed accomplice

MAR Pariya, remember him? He is the Vice President's personal assistant who has been at the centre of the tellit-all between the President and his boss.

Mr Pariya survived an assassination attempt yesterday in Abuja, the Atiku Campaign Organisation said. A security aide to Pariya killed one of the suspected assassins, it was learnt.

Pariya was not at home when the suspected assassins called because he stayed in Abuja after returning from the airport at 2am, following the presidential order that denied the Vice President access to his official plane for a scheduled trip at about mid-night. This is the second attempt at "armed robbery" within the last 12 months, the organsiation said.

It recounted the incident, saying: "A team of armed men estimated at about five arrived at Pariya's Gwarimpa residence at 7am and gained entry into the

compound when they put a gun to the head of a household staff member named Ibrahim. He was abducted on his way back to the house after purchasing a GSM recharge card in the neighborhood. Each armed with a pistol, four of the assassins broke into two groups upon entry into the compound. At gunpoint two of them attempted to force Ibrahim to lead them into the main house through the side/kitchen entrance. When they became convinced that he had none of the keys, they allowed him to proceed to the boys' quarters to make

a phone call to the main house for the door to be opened.

"While this drama unfolded, the mobile policeman (MOPOL) on duty who had changed into mutti and was preparing to go off-duty encountered one of the armed men who had hidden his gun as he walked aimlessly in the compound. The hoodlum pretended to be a casual

NEITI indicts CBN, NNPC in alleged oil industry's fraud

HE Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN), Nigerian National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC) and other federal agencies were last night knocked by the final audit report of the Nigerian Extractive Transparency Initiative (NEITI) for alleged fraud in oil and gas sectors.

The report claimed that by December 2006, there were differences in the figures paid by companies as Petroleum Profit Tax (PPT), royalty and gas flaring penalty and what was captured by the CBN and the firms.

The report stated that "CBN reported \$0.9 million as PPT while the companies reported \$1.4. Companies

10 policemen killed in Ibadan, Port Harcourt

SEVEN policemen were killed yesterday in Ibadan, the Oyo State capital, where robbers launched an all-night raid on two banks.

It was a bad day for the force: masked and armed militants stormed a Total Oil facility in Obagi, near Omoku, Rivers State, and shot to death three mobile policemen.

Residents of the University of Ibadan (UI), where the two banks raided are located, woke up to behold the gory scenes of blood splashed on the grounds near the banks.

Many held their heads in their hands as they saw several pellets of spent bullets that littered the scenes.

Eyewitnesses said the armed robbers, numbering about 30, drove into the area in a convoy of cars.

A source said: "They alighted from the vehicles and started shooting indiscriminately into the air. The sound of their guns was as if a war was going on. We didn't sleep till morning.

Shell pullout said they will not involve staff as the firm will stay put and oil and gas production will not be affected.

"Dependants of expatriate staff are being relocated as a precautionary measure because of the explosion, said Shell spokesman Bisi Ojediran. A senior Shell executive

added: "We are not sure if this thing is going to deteriorate. If it deteriorates we will have fewer people to contend with."
