JTF recovers remains of expatriate

HE Joint Military Task Force (JTF) has recovered the remains of an expatriate worker in Port Harcourt, Rivers State.

The body was found floating on Ogbogoro River by the local people who contacted the task

While it was difficult to establish his nationality as at press time, it was believed that the victim of the Niger Delta crisis was

one Dave Worth, a Briton.
Worth, who was kidnapped sometime last month, along NTA Road in the Garden City, was the only kidnapped expatriate still in custody of the militants. The state police commissioner, Mr. Felix Ogbuagu and Major Sagir Musa, spokesman for the

JTF confirmed the story.

Musa told newsmen in
Port Harcourt yesterday
that scientific method
would be employed to
identify the nationality.

Meanwhile, men of the JTF have arrested persons suspected to be involved in

the killing of some chiefs in Ogbogoro community, Obio-Akpor Local Government Area of the State. They were arrested when JTF stormed the three communities of Ogbogoro, Ozuoba, and Rumuekini in search of the killers.

Spokesman of JTF in Port Harcourt: Major Masa.

who confirmed the arrest of the six youths said that three of the suspects were picked up from Ogbogoro community, while the remaining were apprehended in their hideouts in Numuekini.

Following the heavy presence of soldiers in these communities, especially Ogbogoro, the residents have deserted it to avoid being caught in the man-

hunt mounted by the soldiers.

The JTF were dispatched to stabilise tension resulting from the killing of the chiefs on Thursday by suspected cultists.

Though not the first time the community has been embroiled in crises, but this fresh one was said to have started last Wednesday when the chiefs of the community gathered and performed some rituals to sanitise the place of cultism and violent crimes.

In doing that, they were able to fish out three boys suspected to have been involved in the kidnapping of a bank manager and handed them over to men of JTF. Their other partners in crime were said to have gone into hiding on hearing of this.

By the next day, these boys came out from hiding and went straight to the council of chiefs chambers where the chiefs were still meeting and killed about six of them for betraying them.

Among those killed were the paramount ruler of the community, Chief Richard Amadi, who was also a onetime lecturer with the state college of education, one Doctor Wali, and four others.

But the commissioner of police, Mr Felix Ogbaudu, told The Nation that five persons were killed contrary to earlier reports that six were mowed down by the boys. The five persons, Ogbaudu said, included Amadi, Wali and three women.

The CP also said that no arrest had been made in connection with the killing "but we have identified the arrowhead of the attack"

arrowhead of the attack."

The fears of these soldiers have made the community people to start fleeing the place for places like Choba and Rumuoparaeli within the LGA.
