Two dead in Tejuosho market fire

was double tragedy at the popular Tejuosho market, Yaba, Lagos Mainland yesterday. Two men, battling to put out a late evening inferno which gutted the market were killed.

Traders who had closed on Tuesday evening after the day's job lost their wares to the fire which took hours to

Governor Babatunde Fashola, who was at the market yesterday, expressed shock and ordered its immediate closure.

A failed rescue mission to contain the fire caused the death of the two men said to have been trapped in the mar-

The duo, whose identities remained unknown yesterday, and an official of the State Fire Service were trapped as they strove to curtail the inferno, described as the worst in the market's history, from spreading to other sections.

The fire man has been to cued while the remaining two have not been found, even as the traders, yesterday counted their losses.

A trader, simply identified as Emeka sat on a burnt table.

"I no know how I go start again oo," was all he muttered as friends and symphatisers tried without success to con-

"Every time na im dis market dey burn, everytime.

He watched as smoke and smoldering ash billowed from what was once his only source of livelihood.

Goods worth several million of naira were lost.

Some people believed the inferno was caused by an electrical fault in a section of the market known as Canteen.

The fire, The Nation learnt started at about 7:30pm in the canteen section of the market after most traders had closed

Few people were inside the market when the fire started. None could, however, do

anything to prevent the fire from spreading because of its sheer intensity.

Some who made initial attempts to check it failed. The Nation watched as sev

eral traders and symphatisers tried to clear the debris, while several others watched speechless.

They were yet to come to terms with the magnitude of their losses.

Most of the affected shopowners had travelled for the yuletide, making identification of wares almost impos-

Market officials were however unavailable for comment, at the time of this re-

Several people expressed displeasure at the slow response to distress call by fire fighters. Ojuelegba fire sta-

tion, few minutes drive from the scene could have checked the inferno, some people said.

A resident, who gave his name as Isiaka Oyetunde, said it smacked of irresponsibility and outright negligence on the part of the Fire men, whose office is located close to the area, but still failed to show up.

We do not know what they are paid for if they can not come at a time when

they are mostly needed. "Several people even went to their office to alert them immediately it (the fire) started but they did not show

up," he alleged.

There was also widespread discontent that the police failed to rein in the Area Boys or street urchins, who were on the loose and prevented genuine residents from taming the fire. The development fuelled suspicion that some yet to be identified persons are behind the incident for reasons best known to them.

The social miscreants, rather than salvage wares, took undue advantage of the incident to break into shops to loot.

"How can people be looting those who have lost so much already and the police

can not apprehend them," he fumed.

Akeem Bello, the media aide to Governor Raji' Fashola, however, praised the fire fighters for rising to the

Fashola yesterday expressed sadness over the fire which occurred at the Tejuosho Market. He ordered and directed the immediate closure of the mar-

The governor said the market would not be reopened until his administration was satisfied that the structures are fit for commercial activi-

Fashola, also directed the pulling down of the market even as he appealed to the traders to vacate the area as the Police have been directed to take charge of the area. .

He explained that heavy duty equipment already deployed to the site could only move in and rescue those who might have includir personnel of the State Fire Service only when the traders have vacated the market.

He said the structure of the market had weakened as it was constructed over 30 years ago, saying the state government would rebuild the market into a model market befitting the status of the area.

Fashola said the state government might acquire some properties around the market in order to ensure that the state builds a ultra-modern market that will accommodate all the traders in the area
