HREE persons were yesterday feared dead in a fire that gutted the Yelwa market in Jalingo, the Taraba State capital.

The traders had hardly closed their shops when a bus driver, who apparently lost control, ran into some jerry cans loaded with petroleum products. There was an explosion, and the market went up in flames, eyewitnesses told
