GUNS boomed. Smoke darkened the skyline. Security men chased rampaging

Some major streets were strewn with bodies. Some reporters said 200 may have been killed in the renewed violence in parts of Jos, Plateau State. Others said no fewer than 50 may have died in the violence.

A 24-hour curfew has been imposed on Jos and the Bukuru metropolis, following renewed violence in Nasarawa Gwong, Jos. $\,$

reason for the latest violence, police authorities said on Monday, is that "Muslim youths, without provocation, attacked Christians in a church in Nasarawa Gwong"

The police are, however, still quiet, two days after the mayhem, about official figures, prompting fears that the casualty must have risen to a record high. Many houses and places of worship are burnt.

But, the government yesterday imposed a 24-hour dusk-to-dawn curfew to stem the violence.

The police authorities had announced over 60 arrests of suspects, said to have been brought in from neighbouring states

Information and Communications Commissioner Gregory Yenlong, who announced the stand of the government on state radio and television stations, PRTVC, said the decision followed "consultation with the State Security Council this morning (yesterday) after the prevailing security situation in the state was reviewed"

The commissioner said the "government was aware of plans by some disgruntled elements to cause disaffection so that the present government would be brought to its knees". He warned: "The government is not going to let its authority be undermined by anybody or group of persons, no matter how highly placed."

The statement advised residents "not to take the laws into their hands"

The latest decision by the government superseded the dusk-to-dawn curfew it announced on Monday.

Throughout Monday night, residents of Bukuru, Gyel, Kuru, Vwang and Du in Jos South Local Government did not sleep as they kept vigil, following rising tension of an attack by the youths who reportedly thronged the Bukuru Mosque at about 1am, singing war slogans.

Residents of Congo-Russia, Katon-Rikkos, Nasarawa Gwong, Alli Kazaure, Mista-Alli, Gada-Biyu, Utan, Abba-Nashehu, Gangare, Tina Junction, Millionaires' Quarters, Sabon-Layi, Angwan Rukuba, Garba Daho, Chelyap, Tudun-Wada, (Ji-She), Laradura, (Alheri), Kuwuri, (Angwan Soya) and Jos-Jarawa stayed awake all night.

Our reporters, who are monitory the crisis from various areas in Jos North and Jos South local government areas, said the situation was being brought under control but observed there were mass movements of residents who are either from perceived "danger zones" to "safer-zones", largely on religious sentiments.

Central Mosque head Balarabe Dawud said at least 800 people had been wounded, 90 of whom had been taken to military hospitals with serious injuries

Fighting spread to Bukuru on the outskirts of Jos during the day, leaving another three dead and 39 injured, paramedic Maryam Mohammed said at a clinic there.

Dawud said the Jos central mosque had run out of medical supplies to treat the injured. "Even neighbourhood private clinics are full with the injured. Normally these are the places we would have gone to for supplies, but they are also in need of them," he said.

David Maiyaki, a Christian resident of the Dutse Uku area of Jos where the new fighting erupted, said the clashes had gone on despite the curfew. "Fighting is continuing unabated," he said

"We woke up to new fighting this morning. As I am talking to you we are indoors, but there is burning and gunshots all around us," Maiyaki told AFP by phone.

Ibrahim Mudi, a resident of Sabon Fegi suburb, said: "From here I can hear gunshots and see burning buildings from a neighbourhood in the northern part of the city"

"It seems that Jos north is completely on fire," added Mudi, who spoke by phone from his veranda.

Mohammed Ahmad from the Unguwarrogo area said the city "is enveloped in smoke and gunshots have filled

"It's quite terrifying. We are indoors but we don't feel safe. It's like any moment something is going to happen to

Sunday's fighting had been confined to the predominantly Christian Nassarawa Gwon area but has since spread to other parts of the city, the army said.

"It is not concentrated, it is not limited to one area, it is scattered," army spokesman Colonel Galadima Shekari

1 sur 6 20/01/10 16:13 Notable citizens of the state have condemned the carnage. Former Deputy Governor Michael Bot-Mang, in a statement signed by his former Chief of Staff, James Stephen Pam, denounced the behaviour of these "so-called youths".

The former deputy governor in the Dariye administration, called on the Jang administration, to take bold steps in arresting all culprits and deal "decisively" with "perpetrators of the latest crisis".

Raymond Dabo, deputy chairman of the People's Democratic Party, PDP, in the state said: "The skirmishes in Jos again is another pointer that there are people who are out to destroy the state and democracy. God will put them to shame...".

The Red Cross said over 4,000 refugees scattered in three camps are facing hardship. It called for urgent assistance to provide them comfort, saying they are mainly women and children.

According to an official, Mr. P. Manasseh, the refugees now sleep on bare floors and with the biting harmattan cold, their conditions have further deteriorated. Mats, blankets and food are needed, the Red Cross said.

The state's Inter-religious Council condemned "the recurring civil disturbances", and called on all to embrace peace and be their brothers' keepers. The co-chairman and Catholic Archbishop of Jos, Rev. Ignatius Kaigama, made the plea in a statement.
