60 held in Kano over murder of traffic warden

OME unidentified Sassailants yesterday in Kano stabbed to death a traffic warden, Halilu Saleh, while on duty.

The Commissioner of Police, Alhaji Muhammadu Tambari Yabo, told *The* Nation that the deceased was on duty on the fateful day, when he was killed. He was killed when he halted his assailant.

Yabo said the incident happened on France Road at about 6.30pm, while the hooligans were returning from Kano Pillars Stadium after an amateur match between One Touch Football Club, Kano and visiting Bida Lions from Niger State.

He explained that the 2-2 result of the match seemed not to have gone down well with the home supporters, who were moving on a break-neck

speed towards France Road by Court Road junction, where they were st<mark>opped, alongside</mark> other motorists.

He further explained that unknown to the traffic Warden, the hoodlums were angry over the abrupt stoppage, as they made a U-turn, advanced to the direction of the Traffic Warden, who was backing them, while directing traffic and stabbed him twice on his back, with a sharp object before escaping.

The traffic Warden, a grade three Officer, whom he disclosed has put in more than 25 years in service slumped on the spot, with blood gushing out of his body, and no one came to his rescue, as everyone within the vicinity took to their heels for fear of arrest.

However, the owners of AdonaiNet, whose operation was approved by SEC six years ago along with the electronic bonus, biometrics and e-IPOs (Initial Public Offerings), are also filing for

This followed the failure of

the defendants to maintain the status quo as ordered by the court when the case came up last December.

The plaintiff on January 26 wrote to the Managing Director, CSCS Limited requesting him to effect payments for services rendered to enable it meet obligations to consultants and other stakeholders in the trade alert value chain.

AdonaiNet in the letter signed by Dr Gbolahan Alli-Balogun, its managing director, recalled "that all brokers, by regulation and convention, routinely remit the Trade Alert commission emanating from their transactions to the CSCS, by the 15th of every month for onward transmission to our organisation, after the CSCS

has deducted its agreement charges, Commission on Transaction (COT) and man-

Part of the problem between both parties is NSE's plan to acquire 75 per cent stake in AdonaiNet.

'The NSE/CSCS did not conceptualise Trade Alert, nor fund its research; contribute to software acquisition; was not involved financially in the purchase of hardware or the six-month free trial period for investors; do not pay consultants; is not involved in software and hardware upgrade, does not contribute to purchase of consumables for the scheme; does not pay the staff or management and is not involved in funding overheads or operations

Tenure: Governors know fate today

FEDERAL High Court, Abuja, will today deliver judgment in a consolidated suit filed by five governors to have their tenure extended beyond 2011 by the Inde-

pendent National Electoral Commission (INEC) The governors are contesting that Section 180 (2) of the 1999 Constitution, provides for a four-year tenure of office for a governor from the day he took the Oath of office and Oath of Allegiance.

They are Ibrahim Idris (kogi), Muritala Nyako (Adamawa), Timipre Sylva (Bayelsa), Aliyu Wamako (Sokoto) and Liyel Imoke (Cross Rover).

They are arguing that the provision of the law on this is sacrosanct and cannot be abridged or ignored, having won re-run elections and taking fresh oaths of office.

But the government through the Attorney General of the Federation and Minister of Justice, Mohammed Adoke (SAN) believes fresh elections must take place in their states.

18 killed in Plateau village pre-dawn attack

IGHTEEN persons were killed yesterday in another pre-dawn attack in Bere village which borders Barkin Ladi and Mangu local government of Plateau State respectively.

The community was, according to the chairman of the local government, Dr. Pam Dakwak, attacked by Fulani pastoralists at about 1am.

The council boss confirmed that 17 people were killed by attackers; one of the suspected Fulani attack-ers formerly residing in the locality was said to have been gun down by men of the Special Task Force (STF) on Jos crises, 'Operation Safe From Yusufu Aminu Idegu,

According to the commander of the STF: "The attack was very swift, it was well planned by the attackers and so before my men could get there they have done the damage and fled. My men were able to get only one of them, which was my pain, they could have got more than that. But I must confess to you it was a very swift attack"

The Fan district inhabited majorly by the Berom tribe was attacked a few weeks ago. Twelve people were killed in the attack.

Plateau State police Command, through his spokes-

man, ASP Apev Jacob, confirmed the attack, "Eighteen people were killed, no arrest has been made so far. We appeal to the people to assist security agents by given useful information and report suspicious movements on time for prompt action'

There has been widespread rumour of attack within the last few days in Jos, prompting the Police Command to allay the public fear.

However, securitymen were concentrating on the Jos-Bukuru metropolis, headquarters of Jos North and Jos south lo-cal governments in Barkin

Ladi local government.

The military troops who have been in Jos since January last year were changed last month to ensure effectiveness in their operation.

Last week, the commander of the STF Brig. Gen Hassan Umaru held a parley with members of the troops in Jos aimed at ensuring effectiveness in their special duties.

Notwistanding the change of guard, in January alone not fewer than 30 people have died in Jos as a result of conflict between Muslims and Christians on one side and Fulanis pastoralists and Berom farmers on the other side.

No bomb threat in Abia, says govt

THERE is no threat of bomb blast in Umuahia or any other part of Abia State, the government said.

In separate statements, he said, Commissioner for Information Dr. Anthony Agbauere and Special Adviser on Media Mr Ben Onyechere, faulted the claim by the Progressive Peoples Alliance (PPA) that there was explosion at its campaign rally on Monday. Onyechere described the PPA allegation as

smokescreen designed to attract sympathy.'

He said it was meant to discourage President Goodluck Jonathan from visiting the state for the presidential campaign tomorrow.

Agbazuere said the President would inuagurate some projects including the stateof-the-art ultra modern diagnostic centres in Aba and Umuahia and the dualised Aba-Owerri road in Aba.

The commissioner said the

bomb blast story was a fabrication concocted by a former governor of the state to dissuade the President

from visiting Abia. He said if there was a bomb blast, the rally could not have continued. There would have been a police report as well.

"Everybody knows the re-lationship between the former governor and Governor Theodore Orji, so people will not be surprised at such a blatant mischief". Onyechere said the alarm

raised by some PPA members is "a hoax geared towards attracting sympathy on one hand and a smokescreen of their intended actions of replicating their handiwork of violence as elections draw near.

This false alarm is coming on the heels of the discovery of plans to destabilise the state by former governor who is unlenting in bringing about woes and discomfort to the people of Abia, having failed in the act of kidnapping.
