EMBERS of the Boko Haram sect struck L 🗸 🗘 again on Wednesday night. They invaded a Borno State village in three lorries.

Their entry into Mainok village, in Kaga Local Government Area - 60 kilometres from Maiduguri – sent the village into panic.

They invaded the residence of the village head, who was not at home but killed his brother Fanami and another person whose name could not be immediately ascertained.

The Boko Haram men divided themselves into three groups as they shot indiscriminately at people and into the air, according to evewitnesses.

They also attacked the police station in the village, the office of the Federal Road Safety Corps (FRSC) and some other government buildings.

Joint Task Force spokesman Lt.-Col. Hassan Mohammed confirmed the incident. He said no arrest has been made.

Lt.-Col. Mohammed also yesterday said there is a nexus between Boko Haram and al-Oaeda.

"Boko Haram is al Qaeda," he said in an interview with Reuters.

"I see perfect links. It cuts across boundaries, al Qaeda has no boundary; Boko Haram has no boundary. All terrorists, one problem," said Lt.-Col. Mohammed, who was dressed in camouflage and flanked by

As part of steps to check Boko Haram menace, a shake-up is imminent in the operations of the Police.

It was learnt that Inspector-Gen-

eral of Police Hafiz Ringim has asked all Deputy Inspectors-General of Police (DIGs) to go for operations and supervise activities in all the zones.

Also, an enquiry into the recent bomb blast at a Mobile Police Force Base in Gombe has started at the Force Headquarters with some officers and men invited for interrogation.

According to sources, the police may review their mode of operation to cope with the security challenges being posed by

Boko Haram.

A source said: "The IGP might effect a shake-up to make the Force more responsive to the latest security challenges.

"One of the new features of the restructuring is to make all police officers, from the IGP to the least officer, to be involved in checking any security threats.

"The security challenges at hand now cannot be left to the Commissioners of Police alone; all hands will now be on deck."

The source added: "For instance, all DIGs will now be involved in operations and supervise activities in the zones for more proactive responses.

"Although some officers did not like the idea of the DIGs coordinating operations but the police management felt they have to provide leadership."

The Deputy Force spokesman, CSP Yemi Ajayi, said: "I have not seen the signal that DIGs will coordinate operations. When I get to the office, I will find out."
