Campus journalists lose member

EMBERS of the Nigerian Union of Campus Journalists (NUCJ) have condoled with family of Ifeanyi Basil, their colleague, who died in an auto crash recently.

Ifeanyi, a student of Delta State Polytechnic (DELSU), was knocked down on his motorcycle by a speeding vehicle on the Ogwashi-Uku road, a few kilometres away from the campus. He

died on the spot.

In condolence letter titled: Yet another tragedy, signed by Emmanuel Ahanonu, NUCJ National President, the campus journalists said the Ifeanyi's death threw the body into mourning when it was still in grief for another member's death. They described their colleagues' death as tragic.

Emmanuel said Ifeanyi was a committed campus journalist. He called on government to save the lives of its citizens by repairing the roads.

"The deceased family's pride to see their son become a graduate must has been short-lived. The entire body of campus journalists is sad over this loss. Government must pay adequate attention to the poor state of our roads. We cannot continue to lose promising Nigerians to these death traps," he stated.

The late Ifeanyi has since been buried in Onicha-Uku in Ndokwa West Local Government Area of Delta State. The funeral mass was conducted by amendment for graduating students in situations like this one. So, I will have to cough out another N500, 000 again for my child to graduate?"
