Seven days to guber, assembly polls: Gunmen on rampage in Rivers Dout Tical violence of Ex-council boss, monarch, six others feared dead of APC leaders go into hiding

State last night ahead of next weekend's governorship/ state assembly election.

Seven members of the All Progressives Congress (APC) including the party's leader in Obrikom, Onelga Ogba Egbema Ndoni local government area and two of his sons were shot dead by thugs suspected to be working for the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP).

Felled were the traditional ruler of the town, a former caretaker chairman of the local government area, his two sons and three others.

Other party supporters in the area immediately went into hiding.

police spokesman, Mr. Muhammad Kidaya, a deputy superintedent of police (DSP) said last night that they were yet to be formally informed.

However, the APC chairman in the area, Mr. Felix Ejechi, speaking by phone from hiding, said the gunmen struck at about 6pm yesterday, killing the ex-caretaker chairman of the council and his two sons before proceeding to set his house on fire.

Ejechi could not confirm the death of the traditional ruler and three others.

Another APC chieftain in the area, Jude Chinia, said by Precious -DIKEHOWA

"We have called the police commissioner, but he has failed to pick our calls. As I am talking to you, the police have not visited the area.

"We said it before now that

PDP thugs in Ogba/Egbema/ Ndoni LGA want to kill all APC leaders in the area before the next election."

In the run-up to last weekend's presidential/national assembly elections, suspected PDP thugs violently disrupted several APC rallies in the state.

Some APC supporters were killed while others were maimed in the process.

The APC protested to the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) that no elections took place in the state last week as the PDP had a field day manipulating the

However, INEC said the provisions of the electoral laws were sufficiently complied with in the conduct of the elections.

Earlier yesterday, Governor Rotimi Amaechi in a state wide a broadcast called for peace in next week's governorship elec-

tion, saying: "Elections in Rivers State should be about equity and our peaceful co-existence as a people. It should be about encouraging those who aspire to office to work in the interest of the people. I am optimistic that these elections will be historic for us now that the whole world is watching and waiting to see the outcome.

"The presidential elections have come and gone and we are still united as a nation. Re-

grettably, we lost a number of our citizens to death as a result of unprovoked attacks. Some of our citizens have also been harassed, kidnapped and thrown into detention on trumped up charges. My sympathy goes out to the families of all those who have lost their lives. I also want to reassure all those who are still in detention that the night may be long, but dawn must come. Indeed, dawn is here. "
