The 26-year-old deceased, according to sources had returned home on Thursday November 2, 2017, and told his neighbours he was going to visit an ATM centre to withdraw some money around 5 pm.

Oluyemi however did not return home several hours later, which prompted his neighbours to call his mobile phone. The calls were how-

ever not answered.

The Nation learnt that a search party organised for him did not

also yield fruit.


Our correspondent learnt that Oluyemi's death had sparked a row with his family members accusing the school of complicity in his controversial death.

A member of the family who asked not to be named said there was more to Oluyemi's death than
