Protest in Enugu over murder of councillor by gunmen

ENSION has enveloped the entire Eha-Alumona community, Enugu State, following the gruesome murder of the councilor representing Eha-Ulo ward, in Nsukka Local Government Area Legislative Council, Nelson Sylvester Nnacheta, popularly known as Ofunwa.

Women in the community took to the streets yesterday evening to protest the coun-

cilor's murder.

It was learnt that the law-maker was shot and killed by gunmen around 11:30pm on Sunday at his residence in Umualoji Village, Eha-Alumonah in Nsukka.

Although details of the incident were still sketchy at the time of filing this report, a village source disclosed that his death might not be unconnect-

ed with his crime fighting role in his community and Nsukka LGA in general.

It was further gathered that the lawmaker had been instrumental to the successful busting of criminal hideouts, arrests and hand over of many suspected criminals in the area to the police.

A source said the assailants had stormed the lawmaker's house and started raining bul-

lets on him.

The source added that the councilor ran into a neighbouring compound, from where his body was later recovered.

The development has sparked tension in the town and neighbouring communities with calls for the arrest and prosecution of the culprits.
