Bandits paid N1.5m to build camp in Taraba community



•23 bandits surrendered, one killed

Bandits paid a chief in Amar village of **Karim Lamido Local Government** of Taraba State N1.5million to establish their camp in the area.

This was made known when troops of the 6 Brigade, Nigerian Army and Sector 3 Operation Whirl Stroke (OPWS) cracked down on a notorious bandit camp where they killed a suspected bandit in Angwan Bala, Kambari village of Karim Lamido Local Government.

Acting on credible intelligence, the troops went to a hideout, and on sighting the patrol team, the bandits opened fire, prompting a response from the soldiers.

Read Also: Wike shuts 'hospital' in FCT, arrests operator In the ensuing firefight, one bandit was killed, while 23 others, including 19 males and four females, the Acting Assistant Director, Public Relations of the Brigade, Captain Olubodunde Oni, said in a statement. **Related News** According to Captain Oni: "Preliminary investigations revealed that the bandits originally from Plateau State, paid a local chief in Amar village, the sum of N1,500,000 to acquire and establish their camp in the area." He said a search of the camp led to the recovery of a significant cache of arms and ammunition, including four AK-47 rifles, five AK-47 rifle magazines, 80 rounds of 7.62mm special ammunition, one English-made pistol, two locally made guns, 28 cutlasses, 16 motorcycles, 48 daggers, and jack knives. The Brigade Commander, Brig.-Gen Kingsley Chidiebere Uwa, reaffirmed their commitment to the security and stability of the state and its environs.
