the constitution to be able to stagger the elections to ease the burden of logistics.

Also speaking, the Executive Secretary of the State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA), Mr. Nnamdi Nze-Ihezue, accompanied by the South-South Zonal Coordinator of National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA), Mr. Martin Osuwah, told newsmen that the team arrived at the crash site on time and was ready to commence work but that it was barred from entering the site by the Naval officers.

It was learnt that the crash was responsible for the delay in the distribution of electoral materials to the local government areas in the state.

Commenting on the elections, a member of the Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) Board of Trustees and a frontline politician in Imo State, Chief Emmanuel C. Iwuanyanwu commended INEC for the peaceful conduct of the exercise.

He said that the election would have commenced on schedule but for the crash.

Iwuanyanwu expressed the belief that PDP would consolidate on its victory in the state.

He predicted that if the results of the elections are announced, PDP will win all the way.
