Kwankwaso orders conversion of ministry complex to school

Kano State Governor. Engineer Rabiu Musa Kwankwaso has directed the State Ministry of Education to convert the old Ministry of Works (Annex) complex along Ibrahim Taiwo Road in Kano city to a public Secondary School between now and September, 2011.

Governor Kwankwaso gave the directives when he paid an unscheduled visit to the complex, stressing that the directives became imperative considering the necessity to decongest the existing, schools in the state as well as to compliment the zeal of his administration in boosting the education sector.

"The project must be

completed on schedule for the prospective beneficiaries to start academic activities in earnest", the governor stressed, instructing that the main gate of the complex be relocated to its eastern side to prevent accidents caused by wanton crossing of the main road by the students.

Dr. Kwankwaso spoke on the need for the construction of an overhead pedestrian bridge along the Kofar Nassarawa - Ibrahim Taiwo road axis to ease movement.

Conducting the Governor round, the permanent Secretary, state Ministry of Health Malam Tajuddeen Gambo explained that the complex would comprise 50 classrooms, administration block, a library, laboratories,

play ground, assembly hall. toilets and workshops among other things.

While assuring of readiness to commerce work on the project soon, the Permanent Secretary told the Governor that because of the good quality of the most of the existing buildings, they would not be demolished but would be renovated to suit the architectural needs of the school.

Meanwhile, the Governor and his deputy Dr. Abdullahi Umar Ganduje were at the Ado Bayero House, the State ICT Park for inspection and were conducted round by the Permanent Secretary of the State Ministry of Science and Technology, Alhaji Auwalu Zubairu Galadanchi.

"With pains. this administration made it known to the labour leaders that, unless government's earnings significantly improved, it would be impossible for it to pay the new minimum wage. For instance, the administration took labour on a journey into Lagos State earnings and informed it that the state's monthly Internally Generated Revenue alone stands at N20 billion, on the average. Out of this, the state pays its monthly wage bill of N5 billion, which is 25% of its IGR, leaving a substantial portion of its IGR specifically 75% - and the Statutory Allocation from the Federation Account, to target infrastructural development.

Conversely in Oyo State, however, 400 per cent of the state's IGR will be needed to implement the payment of salaries as demanded by labour,"the governor noted.

Governor Ajimobi while thanking traditional rulers. religious leaders, retired permanent secretaries, Heads of Service and community leaders in the state for their intervention which prevented industrial disharmony in the state assured that there will be no going back in his administration's determination "to reposition our dear state, to reform it and transform it.,"saying," We will tackle decay in infrastructure headlong and bring smiles to the generality of our people".
