FRSC recovers 10-month old boy from accident

THE Federal Road Safety Corps (FRSC) on Tuesday recovered a 10-month-old boy from an accident that occured on the Lagos-Ibadan expressway.

The FRSC Oluyole Unit Commander, Assistant Corps Commander Sanya Adeoye, while briefing newsmen in Ibadan, said the boy, identified as Emmanuel, lost his mother in the accident.

According to him, the woman and another passenger died in the accident which involved a 14-seater passenger vehicle with registration number Lagos LND 588 XC.

Adeoye said the vehicle, which was heading to Lagos, had loaded passengers from Iwo Road motor park before the vehicle's tyre burst in a lone incident.

He added that the boy was receiving treatment at Ibadan Central Hospital, Oke-Ado, while the remains of his mother had been deposited at the Adeoyo State Hospital, Yemetu, Ibadan.

Lamenting the difficulty in identifying the personality of the woman, Adeoye said the woman's failure to fill the vehicle's manifest had made it difficult for the FRSC to locate her relations and hand over the boy to them.

While bemoaning some passengers' attitudes to-wards the vehicle's manifest, he said "the manifest would have enabled the FRSC get in touch with relatives of the deceased.

"It makes our job easier in case of traffic crash though we do not pray it happens," Adeoye noted.

He assured that the FRSC had put in place measures aimed at reducing traffic crashes, especially during the 'ember months' and festive periods.
