perience of countries that had faced the challenge of terrorism revealed no quick fixes.

Fulani mercenaries kill 15, set houses ablaze in Nasarawa

## ADEMOLA ADEGBITE -LAFIA

AGAIN, some Fulani mercenaries, on Wednesday morning, besieged another Eggon settlement in Lafia East Development Area of Nasarawa State and killed 15 people.

Eyewitnesses told the Nigerian Tribune in Lafia, the state capital, that the Fulani mercenaries, who invaded Gidan-Mai-Akuya rural community around 10.00 a.m., started shooting at sight and set many houses ablaze.

It was gathered further that the whole community had been deserted, as villagers are now taking refuge at public schools and with relatives in the state capital.

One of the eyewitnesses, Mr Pila Kyia, told the Nigerian Tribune on phone that immediate response of the security operatives prevented the assailants in wreaking more havoc on the villagers.

According to him, soldiers drafted to the area had earlier given the villagers their phone numbers to contact them in case of any attack by the Fulani, who

had, so far, ransacked over seven villages in the space of two weeks.

Kyia said the armoured personnel carrier (APC) used by the soldiers got trapped while chasing the attackers out of the community, a development that rendered them incapacitated in containing the attack.

"The Fulani attacked us and started shooting sporadically. People scampered for safety before soldiers arrived.

"As I am trekking towards Akurba town towards Lafia now, I saw 10 corpses and a corpse of one Fulani man by the roadside," he added.

As a result of the violence,

## CBN to print electoral materials for 2015 elections

CHAIRMAN, Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC), Professor Attahiru Jega, on Wednesday, said the commission would explore ways to collaborate with the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) on the printing of electoral materials for the elections.

This came contrary to rumours doing the round that INEC would print electoral materials for the election abroad.

Professor Jega disclosed this in Abuja, on Wednesday, while receiving in audience the governor of the CBN, Mr Godwin Emefiele, who paid him a visit.

Professor Jega, while acknowledging that the CBN

had been strategic partner of the commission in ensuring free, fair and credible elections in Nigeria, pointed out that since 2011, the CBN had provided services in term of securing sensitive election materials for the commission.

He applauded the apex bank for its services, adding that "I assure you that INEC is willing to discuss the proposal and will continue to explore more ways to collaborate with CBN and look at global picture in terms of what is best for the country.

"INEC and CBN will continue to partner and I hope that the interest of the larger society should be up most."

Speaking earlier, the CBN

governor had said the visit was in line and in tandem with directive by President Goodluck Jonathan that printing of all security materials be done in the country.

According to him, "we have come to collaborate with INEC to ensure that the objectives of ensuring that the printing of materials, as well as transportation of materials from the printing press to the various voting centres, are discussed."

He noted that the NIigeria Security Printing and Minting Company was seeking way through which it could work with INEC, particularly in the area of printing of security documents, especially as it concerns 2015 elections.
