Ekiti: Fed poly shut after protest over death of 2 students

School's health centre set ablaze

Only one person died —Management

HE Federal Polytechnic, Ado Ekiti, Ekiti State, has been shut indefinitely following violent protest by students.

The students were protesting the death of two of them in alleged mysterious health circumstances.

It was gathered that trouble started late Friday, when two of the students reportedly complained of malaria

They were said to have been rushed to the institu-

tion's health centre for treatment but sources claimed that their condition later aggravated. They were said to have died in the early hours of Saturday.

The news of the death of the students infuriated others, who mobilised and marched to the health centre to set it ablaze.

Apart from destroying other property on sight, the students blocked all roads leading to and from the institution

One of the students, who pleaded not to be mentioned, decried the attitude

of the authorities to their welfare and well-being, claiming that their welfare was poorly handled.

The students alleged that the health centre lacked requisite drugs and equipment.

Reacting to the development, the polytechnic's authorities confirmed the death of one student, saying the student had forcibly been discharged from Ekiti State University Teaching Hospital against medical advice.

A statement by the inspokesperson,

Adeyemi Adejolu, in reaction to the riots, said the students destroyed a number of school property.

Adejolu said: "Report came from the teaching hospital on the morning of Saturday, October 7, that the patient was forcibly discharged against medical advice and also without the input or knowledge of the polytechnic about the patient's whereabouts.

"This was the situation until the alleged death of the student was broken on campus heralding the violent protest with the students go-

ing wild with all sorts of lies and burnt down the fullyequipped NHIS-accredited Health Centre, the entrepreneurship and demonstration farms, poultry, fishery etc of the CEDVS as well as the
