## ce to investigate alleged killing of 4 persons in Nasarawa

igerian Tribune gathd that the herdsmen retedly killed scores of Tiv ners in Nasarawa State in past four days.

learnt that settlements longing to the Tiv farms, cutting across Awe and ana local government eas of the state, were reaced to rubbles by the impaging Fulani herdsnen who were said to be rmed with sophisticated veapons.

Speaking to newsmen n Lafia, President of Tiv Development Association (TIDA) in Nasarwa State, Benard Kyegna, gave a graphic picture of the killings, saying, "on the fateful day of the New Year, a man was macheted to death at Gidan Wurji in Awe Local Government Area while

moving his farm produce to Awe town."

He added that another killing occurred on the same New Year day when some armed herdsmen were returning after an attack on Benue State, and gunned to death a man whom they sighted in front of his compound on Awe-Tunga Road, in Awe Council Area of the state.

"We also received a report that two Tiv people were reportedly killed at Bakin Kortaa, a border settlement which is about 12 kilometres from the Benue/Nasarawa border line at about 7:p.m.

"Also a report in my village (Kwarra), in Keana Local Government Area, has it that the herdsmen equally gunned down three farmers while working on their farm.

It was gathered from a victim, Terzungwe Tachin,

who escaped death by the whiskers in the ongoing herdsmen serial attacks in the state that eight Tiv farm- 3 ers had so far been killed in different locations in the aforementioned two council areas of the state.

He gave names of the locations where the eight people were killed by the herdsmen as Tse Kwaghtser - Tunga settlement, Kuduku, Nyashashu, Obosidoma Kaambe - Jangaru.

When contacted, the Nasarawa State Police Command Public Relations Officer, DSP Kennedy Idirisu, however, confirmed that only one person was killed.

In another development, northern states chapter of the Christian Association of Nigeria (CAN), on Thursday, urged the Federal Government to arrest and prosecute perpetrators of recent killings in Benue and

Kaduna states.

Reverend Chairman, Yakubu Pam, who condemned the attacks in a press statement made available to the News Agency of Nigeria (NAN) in Kaduna, said that the government should also take proactive measures to curb future occurrence.

It said the killing of the District Head of Numana in Kaduna State and 50 people in Benue was condemnable, disturbing and worrisome.

"We call for calm in both communities and appeal to government to step up security not only in these victims' communities but the entire country to forestall future killings.

"CAN is disturbed by allegations of security complacency and should be thoroughly investigated by the government to assuage already frayed nerves."

The statement assured the government of the church support and urged church leaders nationwide to calm their members and to report any threat to security law enforcement agencies.
