Police informant shot, beheaded by suspected cultists in A'Ibom

RESIDENTS of 81, Ikpa
Road and the adjoining
communities of Idak Okpo,
Nnung Ikon and Udo Usanga in Afaha Oku, Uyo
Local Government Area of
Akwa Ibom State currently
live in fear, as police continue to raid the area for
criminal elements.

This followed the killing of a 65-year-old police informant, one Raphael Sunday Udofia, by gunmen suspected to be cultists

Another informant, simply identified as Dan Mark, was also fatally shot and left for dead, according to one Effiong Akpan, a local vigilance group member, "but is currently receiving treatment in an undisclosed hospital after the attack.

"He used his hands to try and block the bullets, but the bullets shattered his hands. He immediately fell down and feigned death.
The criminals left him,
_thinking he was dead."

According to Akpan, the deceased informant was shot and then beheaded, leaving the police to retrieve the decapitated body.

He ruled out the case of armed robbery, noting that the hoodlums numbering about 15, who attacked the two informants at the weekend, "never stole any property or cash from the victims."

Udofia, according to family sources, had spent over 18 years in prison for killing his father before returning to take up the vigilance job in the area.

"After the attack, they only stole laptops and phones from some students of the University of Uyo (UNIUYO), before escaping from the scene of the attack," he said.

The matter, it was learnt, was being investigated by

the 'A' Divisional Police Station along the Wellington Bassey Way, Uyo.

When contacted, the Police Public Relations Officer (PPRO), DSP Odiko Ogbeche, said the case had yet to be transferred to the Ikot Akpanabia headquarters.

He assured that no stone would be left unturned in fishing out the suspects, and appealed to residents to cooperate in the investigation.
