

Oyo acting governor mourns slain journalist, visits bereaved family

ACTING governor of Oyo state, Barrister Bayo Lawal, mas paid a condolence visit pot to the family of late Ojo pot Peter, an online media journalist who was tragically has killed by suspected armed ar robbers in Ibadan.

During the visit to the late journalist's residence, in Ibadan, it was marked by solemn moments, emotional tributes, and firm assurances of government support.

The acting governor expressed deep sorrow over the loss, describing Ojo Peter as a dedicated pro-

fessional who died in his prime.

Ojo Peter, a respected media practitioner and publisher of an online news platform, lost his life in a violent robbery incident that has since drawn outrage and grief from journalists, they described the tragedy as a devastating loss, to journalists and the wider public.

grants you the strength to bear this irreplaceable loss. And beyond prayers, we will look into the necessary support that can be extended to the family, especially to ensure the well-being of the children he left behind," he said.

Barr. Lawal commended the NUJ and members of the media who have continued to show support to the late journalist's family since the incident occurred.

The acting governor encouraged journalists to remain united and to honour their late colleague by extending continued assistance to his dependents.
