

# Death toll in Lagos boat collision reaches eleven

The police on Sunday said six more bodies have been recovered from the Ikorodu boats mishap which has claimed more than 10 lives.

Police spokesperson, Frank Mba, said, "Six more bodies have been recovered from the boats mishap bringing the total recovered bodies to 11. Nine are still missing. The Marine police are combing the Ikorodu waters in a bid to recover bodies of the victims."

The incident happened at Bayeku local government council in Ikorodu on Friday around 1.30 pm, when a boat conveying 24 passengers from Bayeku to Langbasa developed a mechanical fault in the middle of the water.

Investigation by NEXT reveals that the boat had an engine problem and was in need of assistance. Another boat heading from Langbasa to Bayeku saw the stranded boat and offered to assist.

This proved to be fatal as passengers from the stranded boat started scrambling to enter the rescue boat.

The rush by the passengers caused the boats to capsize and more than 10 persons including a newly married couple were said to have drowned as at Friday.

Police spokesperson, Frank Mba, confirmed the story. He said, "On the 7th of August, at 2.00 pm, a passenger boat with twenty four passenger including the driver and conductor heading from Bayeku in Ikorodu to Langbasa, developed a fault midway causing water to sip into the boat.

"As the situation worsens, another boat heading in the opposite direction with eleven passengers on board attempting to rescue the boat in distress unfortunately due to the desperation and the

stampede by the passengers in the first boat under distress, the boats got sunk."

Mr. Mba said a team of Marine police assisted by fishermen rescued 15 passengers alive and they were taken to the Ikorodu General Hospital; five persons out of the number rescued were, however, confirmed dead.

"Fifteen persons have been declared missing but our team of Marine police are combing the area in a bid to recover drowned bodies," Mr. Mba said.
