HE Nembe Local Government Vice Chair man, in Bayelsa State, Mr. Tekena Temple-Beregha and the Leader of the Legislative Arm, simply identified as Gbenga, were feared drowned on Saturday in a boat mishap.

Temple-Beregha was a

former President of the liaw Youth Council, while the leader was the councillor representing Nembe Ward 8.

A former Acting President of the IYC, Mr. Nengi James, who is also a native of Nembe, in a telephone interview from the coastal community on Saturday afternoon, confirmed the tragedy.

James said the deceased were travelling to Nembe from Yenagoa, the Bayelsa State capital, when the incident occurred around 1:30 am in Nembe territory.

The youth leader added that their corpses had been deposited at the morque of Nembe General Hospital. with the shocked people mourning.

The Police Public Relations Officer of the Bayelsa State Command, Mr. Ibokette Iniobong, a Deputy Superintendent of Police, also confirmed the incident.

Iniobong, who described the incident as very unfortunate, said the solution to night journeys by boat was two-way, stressing that the boat drivers and the police must cooperate to put an end to it.

The mobile line of the Chairman of Nembe council, Mr. Walter Kurogbofa, was not available, when he was contacted for comments.

It would be recalled that the leadership of the Maritime Workers' Union of Nigeria, Bayelsa State chapter, just last week, warned boat drivers against travelling on the waterways beyond 7 pm, in view of the inherent dan-

The union also called on the state's House of Assembly to put in place legislation to prevent boat drivers from moving at night, in view of the frequent accidents or boats capsizing without rescue efforts.
