## JTF recovers expatriate's corpse from Ogbogoro River

ROOPS from the Joint Task Force on Saturday morning recovered the corpse of an unidentified expatriate floating on the Ogbogoro River in the Obio Akpor Local Government Area of Rivers State.

Sunday Punch learnt that the JTF deployed its troops to Ogbogoro, Ozuoba and Rumuekini - all communities in Obio Akpor - following the killing of three elders by suspected cultists on Thursday.

A source in the community said that soldiers, who were on a patrol duty along the waterfront in Ogbogoro, spotted a corpse floating on the river in the early hours of the day.

He said, "When they got closer, they discovered that it was a white man and they removed the corpse. We don't know how the man

died, but it seems that he was killed by the boys when the soldiers invaded the community yesterday (Friday)."

When contacted, the JTF spokesperson, Major Sagir Musa, confirmed the recovery of the expatriate's corpse. He said that soldiers spotted the unidentified

body while they were patrolling the Ogbogoro waterfront in search of cultists and militants who killed three community leaders in the area.

Musa said that the appropriate government authority would soon carry out an autopsy to determine the identity of the corpse.

He said. "Our men spotted the corpse of an unidentified expatriate in the Ogbogoro River early this morning. The body has been recovered and will be handed over to an appropriate authority to commence the process of

identifying the victim."

The JTF spokesman said that six suspected militants

had been arrested in connection with the killing of the Ogbogoro chiefs.

The Rivers State capital

has been embroiled in a large-scale unrest being perpetrated by militants and cultists since July, leading the state government to order a dusk-to-dawn curfew three weeks ago.
