
"The application process involves the receipt of application requests by the PFA, forwarding of all transfer application documentation as required in the Guideline to Trustfund, which is also copied to the commission.

be considered on merit.

"Trustfund verifies the documentation and obtains the commission's before concurrence instructing its custodian to effect the transfer.

"The discrepancies noted by contributors, if any, have been traced to employers with gap or period with contributions missing because of the unavailability of evidence of remittances such as request instrument, schedule of remittances and non-remittance of contributions by employers and unidentified employers (employers with number and contributions in the data base but without employer's name).

As part of the efforts to establish the amounts to be

transferred on behalf of each contributor to the NSITF scheme, Trustfund has sent statements of accounts to the contributors.

In addition, Trustfund and the commission, it was learnt, had placed advertisements in some national dailies requesting contributors to the scheme to report any observations with a view to having correct and updated records.

Therefore, for these categories of contributors, they are requested to report all discrepancies to Trustfund, update their records with verifiable evidence of remittance(s) at the nearest Trustfund office or perform an online update of their membership records at the Trustfund web site.

But there are also complaints of contributors not being able to access the Trustfund web site where they are supposed to download some application forms required for the transfer.

"With regard to the inability to print statement of contributions from Trustfund web site, the observation has been noted and Trustfund was notified to rectify the problem," PENCOM said.

The Pension Reform Act 2004 provides that contributions to the NSITF scheme and the accrued income shall be transferred into members' RSAs after the expiration of the fiveyear moratorium, which took effect from July 2009.

The act empowers the commission to supervise the transfer of the NSITF contributions, which represents the amount remitted to National Provident Fund and/or NSITF pension schemes by registered employers on behalf of their employees covering the period January 1962 to June 2004.

Asked if there was a limited period within which the transfer should be done, PENCOM said the process would take a minimum of 30 days and could take longer where inadequate documentation had been provided by the contributor.

Police arrest landlord for killing tenant over electricity bill

 Continued from Page 1 SATURDAY **PUNCH** gathered that a N300 electricity bill was the cause of a disagreement between the two men and this later led to Akande's death.

It was learnt that trouble started when the suspect accosted his tenant on his way to work on Monday, demanding the payment of his electricity bill.

Akande's plea that he should be allowed to pay the bill at the end of the month because he was a salary earner reportedly didn't go down well with his landlord.

Disturbed by the ensuing argument, the deceased's wife was said to have intervened by giving the landlord N200, promising to pay the balance of N100 in the evening.

But not ready to allow the issue go that way, Isiaka reportedly slapped his tenant on his cheek and later hit him on his chest.

Evewitnesses Akande collapsed immediately and all efforts to revive him didn't yield any positive result.

Neighbours sympathisers then rushed him to a nearby hospital, where the doctor on duty confirmed him dead.

His corpse was later deposited at the mortuary of the University College Hospital, Ibadan.

Policemen from Moniya Police Station, who were drafted to the scene based on a report made by a resident of the area, later arrested the suspect.

The command's Public Relations Officer, Mr. Olatunji Ajimuda, confirmed the incident to SATURDAY

gunmen Asuspected to be assassins on Friday shot dead the All Nigeria Peoples Party governorship candidate in Borno State, Madu Fannami and six others.

The details of the killings were still sketchy at press time, but the Commissioner of Police in charge of the state police command, Alhaji Mohammed Abubakar.

Abubakar told News Agency of Nigeria in Maiduguri that among the seven persons killed by the gunmen was a little boy, as well as a younger brother of Governor Ali Modu Sheriff.

He said the police had evacuated and deposited all the corpses at the University of Maiduguri Teaching Hospital mortuary.

The police boss said into the investigation killings had started by the command, adding that for now, no arrest had been made in connection with the incident.

The Nigeria Army had earlier placed its officers and men on red alert over the Maiduguri by unidentified gunmen.

Igbo traders in the state had recently ordered the closure of their shops to protest the indiscriminate killing of their members in Maiduguri by the gunmen.

Meanwhile, President Goodluck Jonathan in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, on Friday received with shock the news of the killings.

The President, who is in Addis Ababa to attend the 16th African Union Summit. condemned the act.

CP slaps DPO over inadequate security for DDCMs

The Commissioner of Police, Federal Capital Territory, Mr. John Haruna, allegedly slapped the Life Camp Divisional Police Officer, Mr. Mahmud Umar, for not providing adequate security for the adhocworkers of the Independent National Electoral Commission and the Direct Data Capturing machines being used in the ongoing voter registration.

Haruna was reported to have redeployed Umar, Chief Superintendent Police, to the Area Commander's office for an

alleged dereliction of duty, which he could not explain to the satisfaction of the commissioner.

Trouble started for the embattled DPO when the commissioner got a report that the electoral officials and the DDC machines were not being given the necessary security by the police in the Life Camp area, contrary to the directives from the FCT command.

Haruna was said to have followed up on the report by visiting one of the centres, where he confirmed the absence of policemen.

Livid with anger, he was

said to have summoned the DPO and demanded explanations for flouting a standing order, but the hapless officer could only mumble an apology, which incensed the commissioner.

He allegedly slapped the DPO for his "incompetence" and thereafter ordered his immediate transfer from the post.

The FCT Police Public Relations Officer, Moshood Jimoh, could not be reached for comments as he neither responded to repeated calls to his cell phone nor replied the SMS sent to him.
