Gunmen attack church, kill two Olatunji, Kaduna Protesters hold Yakowa, GOC, SSS director hostage

unmen on Thursday raided night Tabak Village near Zonkwa in Zangon Kataf Local Government Area of Kaduna State, killing two persons and injuring 14 others inside a church.

The attack on the village brought to six the number of such incidents in the last three months in the mainly Christian Southern Kaduna part of the state.

The gunmen swooped on unsuspecting worshippers Joseph Catholic Church during a night prayer session.

An eyewitness claimed that some of the assailants stormed the village through the internationallyrecognised cattle grazing route traversing the area, while the others headed for the Catholic Church where they opened fire on the worshippers.

Two female worshippers were instantly killed in the ensuing melee, while several others escaped from the church with varying degrees of injury.

Some youths in the area have however been pointing

accusing fingers at Fulani herdsmen for the surprise attacks on the people of the

The youth leaders, who pleaded anonymity, blamed the state government and security agents for the series of attack on Southern Kaduna villages since the post-presidential election violence in the state.

learnt that while 14 of those seriously injured during the attack on the village and church were admitted in hospitals in the area, the others were undergoing treatment for minor injuries in their individual homes.

Governor Patrick Yakowa; the state Commissioner of Police, Mr. Bala Nasarawa; and the Special Adviser to the Governor on Security Matters. Col. Dangana Mamman, have been on a visit to the scene of the attack to assess the situation.

The Kaduna State Police Public Relations Officer, Aminu Lawan, confirmed the midnight attack on the village and the killings that occurred in the church.

protesters, The chanted various antigovernment slogans, said that the state government had failed to protect them against attacks from the assailants, who had formed the habit of launching attacks on them at night.

youth leaders Some area eventually the calmed and prevailed upon the protesters to let the governor, who was also in company with the General Officer Commanding One Division, Nigerian Army, Kaduna, Maj-Gen. Joseph Shoboiki, and the Director of the Kaduna State Command of the State Security Service, Mr. Yomi Zamba, visit the injured victims in hospital. Meanwhile, the Christian Association of Nigeria in Kaduna State has expressed concern over the midnight attack on Tabak village and the church.

CAN said that it was unthinkable that such a nocturnal attack had become a commonplace in the southern part of the state, where since last April, police and military checkpoints have been set up and an unofficial curfew imposed on the residents.

CAN Secretary, Rev. Yunusa Nmadu, said in a statement that the killing of innocent worshippers a church during a night service by gunmen had introduced a dangerous dimension to the development in Southern Kaduna since the last April election.

Low patronage forces ram prices down

ow patronage forced the prices of ram down Kwara State on Friday.

economic The harsh situation in the country appeared to be affecting the celebration of this year's Eid-Muslim el-Kabir as many faithful complained of the inability to buy rams.

Our correspondent, who monitored the prices of rams

the Ilorin metropolis, discovered that prices of the rams initially ranged ranged from N20,000 to N150,000, depending on the size. But it had started falling to between N15,000 and N120,000 as at Monday.

Even after the price reduction, many prospective buyers complained of lack of money to buy, while the sellers lamented low patronage.

Some traders and farmers said they had not been able to generate sufficient revenue to buy their rams. Also, some teachers and local government workers said they could not buy rams, as they alleged that they had received their October salaries. It was discovered that

ram sellers, who often came from Zamfara, Katsina, and Sokoto Kano. even

Subsidy: **NIM calls for gradual deregulation**

he President, Nigerian Institute of Management, Sally Dr. Adukwu-Bolujoko, has urged the Federal Government to adopt a gradual deregulation of the downstream sector to reduce the initial hardship the policy may inflict on Nigerians.

She said commencing a full deregulation or full withdrawal of oil subsidy now without palliative measures by the Federal Government would inflict hardship on Nigerians.

She told reporters after the inauguration of NIM, Kwara State Polytechnic chapter, in Ilorin on Friday, that the FG should make the refineries work and refine locally.

She also said the government construct rehabilitate the nation's roads and develop the transportation system.

"The NIM has said that deregulation is good, but it has to be strategic. It should be gradual and not 100 per cent. That is what will inflict hardship. We should withdraw

While we are withdrawing gradually, we are putting other measures together, such as making the refineries to work and efficiently too, and make oil be refined by ourselves and we stop refining outside. There is the need to develop our roads, our transport system so that as people are paying more, they can leave their cars and take cheap transportation, such as rail. These are the things that are done in the developed world,' she said.
