Protest as gunmen kill couple, cleric's children

UNMEN have again killed five people in the troubled Mangu Local Government Area of Plateau State

Among the victims were a couple, identified as Mr and Mrs Patrick and two children of a clergyman identified as Reverend Sati.

It was learnt that the killing occurred in Nchya community in the early hours of Monday after days of respite from attacks in the LGA.

A resident of Nchya community, Philip Bitrus, told our correspondent on Monday that the incident had caused fresh tension in the locality, as angry residents took to the streets in protest.

Bitrus said, "Five people were attacked and killed by suspected Fulani militia in Nchya Village, Mangu District of Mangu Local in Plateau

Government at about 1am last night (07/08/2023)

"Among the victims were Mr/Mrs Patrick and a daughter and son of Reverend Sati.

"The village where the attack occurred is less than 3 kilometres from Mangu town.

"The villagers at Nchya community moved the corpses of the victims in a

pick-up vehicle to Mangu town leading to mass protest in Mangu town.

"It's unfortunate the killing occurred again at a time when the government and other stakeholders are doing everything possible to stop further attacks on the people. especially with the recent establishment of Operation Hakorin Damisa in the Mangu LGA by the Chief of

Army Staff."

The spokesperson for the Military Special Taskforce in charge of maintaining peace in the state, Captain Oya James, confirmed the killings.

"Yes, some people were attacked and killed leading to a protest but we are on top of the situation. Our men are on the ground and we are doing everything possible to address the security challenge in the area," James said.
