A final year Law student of the University of Benin, Benin City, Ronald Ogwum Ify, 26, has been shot dead by two gunmen at his Courage Hostel residence.

P.M.NEWS gathered that the assailants had trailed Ronald, a native of Kwale in Delta State, to his room. They later traced him to the back of his residence where he was about to start his portable generating set.

At a close range, the attackers shot Ronald in the head

The agency said the factory is where the bombs that have rocked Suleja town and its environs leading to the death of many victims were assembled.

The intelligence agency also said it has arrested six persons in connection with the bomb making factory, according to a statement signed by its Assis-tant Director, Public Relations, Marilyn Ogar.

The agency also said it has established that some of the arrested men have links with

global terrorist group, al-Qaeda. SSS, however, did not men-tion the names of the six suspects, but it said in the statement pects, but it said in the statement that the suspects were responsible for the bombing of INEC office in Suleja; bombing of All Christian Fellowship Church in Suleja; and the killing of four policemen at Dakwa-Deidei in the FCT.

The Security agency said the six men will soon be charged to court.

SSS said its investigation was sparked off following the bombings at the INEC office, Suleja on 8 April, 2011 and the All Christian Fellowship Church, Suleja Misselfowship hurch, Suleja, Niger State on 10 July, 2011.

Here is the SSS statement released this afternoon: "Consequently, on 4th August, 2011,

CEYDAR, Kenneth Okonjo, made this call in Lagos at a media briefing on the state of the nation.

a suspect who is a Nigerienne national, was apprehended in connection with the bombing incident in Suleja. He con-fessed to his involvement in the bombings as well as his membership of the Boko Haram sect. His confession led to the arrest of a thirty-one (31) year old indigene of Imo State who

converted to Islam in 2003. The second suspect, who is born of a Nigerienne mother, was brought up in Niger Re-public, where he had his early ducation. He also admitted to being a member of the Boko Haram sect as well as having worked in concert with a third suspect from Kano State to carry out attacks in Suleja.

'Their confessions led to further arrest of two accomplices from Borno State.

"The five (5) suspects all confessed that the main supplier of the explosive materials used for their bombing operations is a miner from Nasarawa State who the Service eventually arrested on 30 August, 2011.

"They also confessed that they took part in the killing of four policemen at a check-point at Dakwa-Deidei in Bwari Area Council of the FCT on 22nd May, 2011.

"Investigation has indeed revealed that the suspects be-long to the Boko Haram cell operating in the Suleja-Abuja axis which is under the direction

and control of a blood-thirsty Boko Haram leader who is now

at large. "Meanwhile, a nondescript building where the Improvised Explosive Devices (I.E.Ds) are assembled has been uncovered at an area popularly known as Chechnya, Hayin-Uku village in Tafa LGA, Niger State.

'Among items recovered in the merchandize of death are: one gas cylinder, one battery damaged detonators, one locally made revolver, one gun butt, two knives; ten GSM handsets with SIM cards, one ceiling fan coil; two laptop computers, 37 unused metallic oil filters; two metallic filters primed for bombing, two metallic cylinders, one clock connected to a primed bladeless ceiling fan with 9 volts batteries ready for use, some pieces of shrapnel, a Honda Civic car with Borno State registration number AG 94 MNG, 200 pieces of detonators, some detonating cords (red colour); a Sony remote control, five battery chargers; and a black bag containing detonating cables."

Protesting Ex-Militants Block East/West Road

Surrender Your Guns, Amosun Tells Ogun Residents National Technical Certificate/

Abeokuta Worried by the crime rate in Ogun Statě, Governor Ibi-

kunle Amosun has ordered all citizens with arms to surrender them for re-certification, warning that those who failed to do so at a stipulated time would have themselves to

The governor gave this directive at an interactive session with stakeholders as part of activities to mark the first 100 days of his administration in office.

Amosun who was responding to questions on the state of security declared that his admin istration could no longer tolerate the use of arms by unauthorised groups or individuals, stressing that there was need to have recertification of all existing arms in the possession of the public to reduce crime rate in the state.

"I will want people to cooperate with us in the area of security. The report at my disposal is that many people are in possession of guns and they will be claiming to have licenses' for them. We want them to submit the guns and reconfirm legality of that license else we will swoop on them as we do not want to turn our state into the haven of criminals. Enough is enough," Amosun declared.

He disclosed that the Federal Government has formally granted the request to have a joint patrol in the state, urging residents to be calm as there was no cause for alarm.

He added that the joint patrol team would be code named, "Operation MESSA."

As part of his administration's achievement in the last 100 days, Amosun disclosed that some money was paid to West African Examinations Council (WAEC), "to enable students in our schools sit for the last May/ June school certificate examina-

tions without any problems."
He added further that, "in order for us to be methodical in the implementation of our affordable qualitative education programme, we have paid N10 million to enable us benefit from the UNICEF sponsored project on the development of the state's strategic plan for the education

He said government has also released grants to seven Technical schools and are in the process of re-equipping the schools to enable them be in a position to provide the much needed corps

of artisans for industrialisation. The state government also paid the fees for the final year students of the Government Technical Schools sitting for the

National Business Certificate Examination.

In the area of tertiary educa-tion, the governor said that the era of no subvention was gone, a development which according to him, "has plagued them for the past eight years in some cases."
He said about about N1 bil-

lion was paid between May and August this year to the state tertiary institutions.

Also, "our government has removed the 50 per cent increment in tuition fees earlier announced by the last administration and we further reduced the tuition fees by an additional 10 per cent." The governor explained that

there is need for some radical overhauling of the system so that government investments will be meaningful, adding "the state government will set up visitation/ fact finding panels for our higher institutions. The panel members will help to ascertain the true situation of things and make appropriate recommendations on the way forward.

Amosun said: "There is a peculiar situation in the stateowned tertiary institutions as the various unions which had their voice muffled in the past are now using the freedom in the present dispensation to agitate for payment of arrears of subvention owed them before our administration assumed office.

35,551 AIDS Victims In C/River EMMA UNA/Calabar

At least 35,551 persons are currently confirmed to be HIV This figure is obtained from tests conducted in hospitals and HIV test centres and other medical facilities across the state.

The Director General of the State Action Committee on Aids, (SACA) Dr Irene Aniyom made the disclosure in Calabar on Monday while interacting with journalists on the campaign against the HIV pandemic after the signing of the Anti-Stigmatisation law by the Cross River State Governor, Mr Liyel Imoke.

Dr Irene said the signing into law the bill on anti-stigmatisation is a major achievement which address issues related to HIV/AIDS scourge in the state.

Although this anti-stigmatisation law is a major achievement, it is however, the beginning of a long journey towards the reduction of stigma and discrimination in the state". She revealed that records have

proven that people living with AIDS suffer all forms of dis-

crimination and stigmatization which resulted in most persons not coming out openly to declare their status which eventually led to more people being infected.

"Over the years, it has been acknowledged that AIDS related stigma and resulting discrimination is not only on the rise but also constitute an obstacle to HIV/ AIDS prevention and treatment despite efforts to address it,'

Recalling the 2003 Sero Sentinel Report on the pandemic which placed Cross River State on the top on the list of new infection among states in the country, Dr Aniyom declared that can we still recall the result of the 2003 Sero Sentinel Survey? Fear of being branded positive has prevented so many people from being tested for the virus or from seeking testament because people who have or are suspected be positive have been shunned, abused, denied jobs or housing

or care. Barrister Ecoma of the state Ministry of Justice said the State Anti Stigmatisation Law which is in five parts addresses issues of counselling, sanctions and litigation.
