When Mrs Florence Mohammed left her Ijigun-Ilo, Ayobo-Ayetoro residence on Saturday morning, May 20, she had no premonition of what awaited her a few hours later. She escaped death by the whiskers from a three-man-gang of armed robbers in a taxi cab.

Her itinerary was to go to Meran through Ayobo to Command. At Ayobo, she quickly made some withdrawals at a first-generation bank. A taxi cab in Lagos colour pulled by shortly. She innocently entered the cab and a bargain was struck. She was the

Her ordeal

Her ordeal has just begun. The two 'passsengers' who are comrades in crime suddenly pulled out their guns. One stayed with Mrs Mohammed at the back seat while the second sat with the driver in front. According to Mrs Mohammed, "I froze and became confused. I couldn't shout. I couldn't pray either."

The robbers thundered at her: "Madam, cooperate or we will just waste you." They collected her two phones immediately and sprayed a substance suspected to be sleep inducing and Mrs Mohammed fell into unconsciousness. The journey progressed.

en she regained consciousness, she asked for her phones but no dice. Her ATM card was also taken from her. While in the robbers i, her account was emptied. To her chagrin, she was taken to an uncompleted but tastefully furnished building in the middle of where

ne wore on. They drilled her until daybreak on Sunday morning. There had been reports that Mrs. Mohammed went out on Saturday rning but never returned. Her phones were switched off.


In the dungeon

Mrs Mohammed spent the night with the hoodlums where she heard the screaming of hapless and helpless victims who were being beheaded for their non-cooperation. "I was offered food but I refused to taste it. Before I was released on Sunday morning, the hoodlums warned me of dire consequences if I should report or take any action against them. A particularly pathetic case was that of a woman and her baby. They wept profusely because they know what fate awaited them. I was induced to sleep throughout the return journey.
