Rivers police bust criminal hideout, kill notorious cultist, robber

Police Command have busted a criminal hideout in a Rivers community and killed a suspected

cultist and an armed robber during a crossfire.

The Police Public Relations Officer of the command, Grace Iringe-Koko, a Superintendent of Police (SP), in a statement in Port Harcourt, noted that

the suspect, Silas Oderereke, has been on the wanted list of police for about four years.

Iringe-Koko disclosed that the police operatives invaded the den of the criminals in the Oderereke com-

munity in Ahoada-West Local Government Area of the state, and that on sighting the police operatives, the criminals opened fire, adding that the 'General' was brought down in the gun battle.

The PPRO said two other suspected criminals sustained injuries, while two of them escaped and are now at large.

She said: "In a major breakthrough, the Rivers State Police Command successfully apprehended a notorious armed robber and cult leader, Silas Oderereke, in Oderereke, Ahoada-West Local Government Area. Oderereke, also known as 'General,' had been on the run for the past four years, evading arrest.
