Violent Communal Clash Claims One in Sango

man was feared killed in Sango, Ogun State yesterday as the Aworis and the Owus clashed over the installation of an Oba by the Olowu of Owu, Oba

Adebowale Dosumu.

Oba Dosumu had allegedly installed Oba Gboun Adebayo, an

Owu indigene, on Awori land.

An Assistant Superintendent of Police, Mr. Sunday Ukata was said to have been shot in the eye in the mayhem during which guns, bow and arrows, machetes and other

weapons were freely used.

For over four hours, the battle raged putting a stop to all human and vehicular movements in the commercial town with all shops

closed and the streets deserted.

Trouble started when the Aworis

embarked on a peaceful protest

against the installation of the oba.

An eye witness told THISDAY that "Members of the Awori Consultative Forum, masquerades, and others started a procession as a form of a protest from Obasanjo's farm in Ota to Sango. An Oba got wind that the Aworis were coming to Sango. He thereby ordered a mobilisation of resistant group to

foil the protest."

When THISDAY visited Sango, gunshots rent the air and people were running helter shelter for fear

of being caught in the crossfire.

Beside Wema Bank in Sango, a

corpse was seen lying by the road-

The warring factions fired gunshots at each other as both sides were heavily armed. They also did not spare the policemen who were drafted in to bring the situation under control, firing at them from both sides. Two armoured tanks with registration numbers NPF 2360 and NPF 676c were brought in and stationed at the Sango-Ota

roundabout.
Among those injured were Chief Bashiru Osunlabi, the fourth in rank to the Olota of Ota, Mr. Afolabi Adeosun, Alhaji Tajudeen Adelowo and Mr. Fatai Lawal who

were taken to different hospitals.
