Death Toll Hits 42 as Foreigners Flee S'Africa

eath toll in the xenophobic uprisings in South Africa has risen to 42 as thousands of immigrants fled the country yesterday despite the deployment of soldiers.

Yesterday, soldiers were still searching the scene of the accident for the mutilated parts of their colleagues who died in the ghastly road accident.

The dead soldiers, including a captain, were returning from peace-keeping operations in Dafur, Sudan, when their bus collided with a petrol tanker.

The Commander of FRSC in Potiskum, Yobe State, Mr Victor Osuhor, told News Against of Nigeria (NAN) that the tanker lost control and rammed into the last of seven military trucks travelling in a

convoy to Borno State.

The tanker dragged the truck several metres before the two vehicles burst into flames.

"Forty-four bodies were evacuated between 2.30 am and 3 am and conveyed to Bauchi while two others were recovered this morning at about 9.
