

Four Dead in Road Accidents

No fewer than four persons including a beggar have died in a triple traffic accident which occurred in Lagos on December 23 and 24, 2010. The Lagos State Police Public Relations

Officer, Mr. Frank Mba, says five more persons sustained various degrees of injuries in the three cases of the fatal accidents recorded by the command on the days in question were taken to hospital for treatment.

The police spokesman said the incident of December 23 occurred when a yet to be identified driver at about 8.30pm ran over a motor cyclist and three pedestrians along Lagos Badagry express road under the bridge by trade fair bus stop. All the victims, he said, were rushed to the hospital but the

cyclist was later confirmed to have given up the ghost.

On the second incident which occurred on 24th at about 12 noon the driver of a tanker truck, identity unknown, with registration number XT 365 LND ran over a road side beggar and three motorcyclists. The beggar and a motorcyclist were reported to have died on the spot while the two other cyclists are admitted in an undisclosed hospital for treatment.

Same day, at Ijede area of the state, at about 6.40 pm, a male driver of a Toyota Previa with registration number DY 393 FST was reported to have lost control of his vehicle. He subsequently ran into a nearby Pentecostal church, World Church Mission, building. A

young man simple identified as Amaechi who sustained serious injuries in the accident reportedly died on the way to the hospital as a result of the seriousness of the injuries sustained.
