Police Sergeant crushed to death in Delta

A SABA—A Police Ser geant was crushed to death in the early hours of Saturday while on duty post near Okpanam junction on Benin-Asaba highway, almost at the same point where 17 passengers were crushed to death during an armed robbery attack over two months ago.

Vanguard gathered that the killed Sergeant was among an Anti-Robbery Patrol Team positioned at that portion of the road which the police authorities in the state had pencilled down as one of the flash

points.

He however met his untimely death when a trailer with registration number Borno XB 169 MAG coming from Lagos towards the East was said to have swerved and knocked down the sergeant. However another account said that the trailer was flagged down to stop, but the driver allegedly refused and in course of the ensuing con-

fusion he hit the Sergeant.

Confirming the incident, the State Police Relations Officer (PPRO), Miss Olabisi Okuwobi said "the Anti-Robbery Patrol Team were on pin down point along Okpanam Hill when one Mark trailer vehicle with registration No Borno XB 169 MAG driven

by one (name withheld) from Lagos swerved and crushed one F/No 77230 Sergeant Sunday Young, a member of the team.

She added that "after the incident the driver ran away without stopping but other members of the team chased and got him arrested by Ibusa

road having deflated his tyre with a bullet", adding that "the victim (Sergeant) died instantly and the body has been deposited at the Federal Medical Centre (FMC) Asaba while the suspect and his vehicle handed over to Motor Police Traffic Division Asaba".
