Thunderstorm kills 13 in Rivers

NO fewer than 13 people have been reported dead, including male and female seafarers, when thunderstorm rumbled through Asarama, Unyeada, Ngo and Akaradi communities in Andoni Council of Rivers State.

Vanguard gathered that four bodies have since been recovered in the weekend disaster, from the surrounding river, few hours after the tornado also destroyed houses, de-roofing some of them as well as uprooting trees which crashed into premises and other property.

The deceaseds' communities could not be immediately ascertained, even as they have been deposited at Otaije mortuary, Iyong Oron Asaram. The storm also swept through Ebukum, Okoloile and Oyorokoto.

As a result of the disaster, scores of persons have been displaced in the affected communities while some have left their villages, particularly fishermen, for other hamlets in search of shelter and succour.

Attempts to speak with

Commissioner for Special Duties, Chief Davies Ikanya, who oversees emergency management department, failed, as his phone was said to have been switched off.

The council chairman could not be reached either, but a source in the community told Vanguard that the council boss, Emilia Nte, had

visited the troubled communities, providing necessary leadership and relief.

However, it was learnt that relief materials, including foodstuff and others were being assembled to be dispatched to the troubled communities by a government agency to ameliorate the effect of the the storm.

IYC urges FG to collect outstanding arms from militants
